If you thought March 17 was the proper time to celebrate St. Patrick's Day, think again. Tonight we have two of the finest Celtic performers anywhere to satisfy every Irish morsel in your body, or in your heart. *Paddy and Eamonn* will fill our evening with Gallic music, spirit and wit.

Paddy Kelleghan is known to and beloved by many of us. For over ten years he has played regularly at John Martin's in Coral Gables and occasionally at O'Casey's in Pinecrest. Paddy is well known in Europe and through out the U.S. touring frequently with renowned fiddler, James Kelly. He accompanies his strong tenor voice with guitar, mandolin, and bodhran with melodies on the flute and harmonica. Paddy has recorded with well known musicians, such as Luke Kelly of The Dubliners.

Eamonn Dillon is a master of the uilleann pipes, reportedly, one of the most difficult instruments to play. He began with tin whistle and low whistle at age



ten in West Belfast and moved to the uilleann pipes at age 14. By 18 he had five titles in the All Ireland competitions including two in first place. In addition to his two solo albums, he has been a guest artist on over 30 recordings including John McDermott, The Ennis Sisters and Shane Cook. He has worked with some of Canada's best such as Mary Jane Lamond and Nova Scotia fiddle champion Ray Legere. He had a PBS special released last year. He has recently formed a traditional band, *Curfa*.

Folk Alliance, I know that most of you did not go to Nashville last month for the yearly folk maniac meeting, but what a thrilling experience, what a fun time. I really believe that the artists from south Florida are as good as most of the national featured performers. I love that there are so many folks from this area who went to Nashville, as a consequence, the quality and quantity of music here is improving. My radio show even benefits when I get feedback on your favorite artists. I am always giving thought on how to expand our folk audience in south Florida, primarily to have a bigger audience to draw from for house, club and festival concerts (radio). I can't go on with out thanking the incredible folks who do work effortlessly toward those goals (I think you know who you are).

This Month on "Folk & Acoustic Music" I have planned the following interviews:

Sunday, March 2nd, is a celebration of woman's history month with Robin Greenstein. I met Robin at the South Florida Folk Festival this past January. On Sunday, March 9th, Aztec Two Step will be in town opening up for The Smothers Brothers. A popular duo from the NE, but they are not well known down here in Florida

With St. Patrick's day coming up, my show on March 16th will be dedicated to the music of Ireland. Finally, on Sunday, March 23rd, I will have Zoe Lewis, Tom Neilson and Cozy Sheridan in the studio. A great lineup. Zoe is from P-Town and is magic. Tom is ready to sing for a cause. Cozy writes with great insight: she has taught me many things about the opposite sex.

CD REVIEW's

Darryl Purpose - Same River Twice

Darryl Purpose is the epitome of the wandering troubadour, with stories to tell and songs to sing: the

stories are fascinating and the songs woven with memories and deeds of past and present: he adds poignant comments and reflects on what is to come and what might be. Darryl made a recent tour of South Florida and delighted audiences with his sparkling performances.

Although Darryl has a comprehensive discography, my favorite is a recent CD he released, called Same River Twice. What attracts me most to Same River Twice is the simple approach to his CD production: just his voice, his guitar, and Darrly S. playing fiddle, plus the emotion that Darryl puts into his songs on stage. My favorites are there: Mr. Schwinn (track 4) and Singer/ Songwriter Heaven (track 12). The name of the CD is actually taken from track 2: a brilliant instrumental guitar piece. Darryl's storytelling permeates the CD: track 1, Halfway Home, is a sad story that could almost be real, maybe it is. If I Were a Betting Man, track 6, is a very interesting slant on relationships: a gambler's view of love. Dangerious Game, track 8, is my preferred track of this CD: Darryl's lyrics bring flashbacks of past experiences. Leave the CD running a few minutes after track 12 finishes for a surprise: A cover of James Taylor's Sweet Baby James.

Same River Twice combines Darryl's songwriting skills, exceptional musical talent and pure energy of presentation into a great package. Don't just take my word for it: please try to see Darryl live when he is next in South Florida, you won't be disappointed. Check his website for gig dates: www.darrlypurpose.com

Maria Sangiolo - The Way We Live

Raging River Records, RRR 104, 45:39 minutes

The mix of sound on The Way We Live is resonant and full, with good vocal harmony. "The Way We Live," the title song is a tender ballad embracing and appreciating a deep, caring Love toward an elderly relative. "The Last Green Valley," the first track, is a good lyric about an undeveloped nature area amidst the sprawling northeast corridor between DC and Boston. Her song "25 Missions" reduced me to tears of sadness, beauty, and sympathetic gratitude. In it she writes about her father, a veteran of WWII and gunner in a B-24 bomber. "Ginny's Garden" is a deeply reverent allegory of a friend's lifetime, seen as a passing year in one's garden. The next track, "Conversation" is an up tempo departure from the flow of the CD, and is a very nice insert, like a bell rung suddenly in deep meditation. "Eternally" is about the love of life and the hope for eternal freedom and



youth. "Bittersweet" is a portrait of, and the love and tender lamentation of the changes and Ravages of aging. "Odyssey" is a quest for permanence and freedom in this world, personal fulfillment, and duty as seen in the Homer's classical and timeless legend of Odysseus. There is also an up-tempo blues song that breaks from the main theme.

In this, her fifth recording, her voice is clear, her guitar playing beautiful, and her compositions simple and eloquent. "The Way We Live" CD is produced well, with full and tenderly powerful sound in the gentler songs. Her writing reminds me of some of Kate Wolf's kind, caring, reverent natural sensitivity in lyrics and music, and of Gordon Lightfoot's delicate touch in some of his songs. 15th ANNUAL FOLK ALLIANCE

The following is an summary of an article written by Kerry Dexter (Kerry Dexter is a contributing editor at FolkWax) and forwarded to us by Susan Moss: we included this interesting material for our folk family:

The 15th Annual International Folk Alliance Conference was held February 6-9 in Nashville, Tennessee. There were panels, receptions, dinners, workshops, a trade show and formal music concerts. The heartbeat of the Conference is in the thousands of private showcase performances, individual artists and small groups bringing their guitars, fiddles, basses, bodhrans and voices to conference rooms, hotel suites and, sometimes, to lobbies and stairwells. These showcases give performers, venue booking people, media representatives and agents the chance to network and meet over the substance of what they do: the music.

This year, at the adjoining Nashville Convention Center and Renaissance Hotel, the performers ranged from Celtic bands to artists from Sweden, from Texas troubadours to New England singer/songwriters, and from those who offered traditional Folk in all its flavors to the most experimental of contemporary Folk-based musicians. Players included well-known Folk musicians such as Ellis Paul and Janis Ian, to tunesmiths such as Terri Allard, Buddy Mondlock and Caroline Herring, to regional favorites, including Kate McDonnell and Albert & Gage. Nashville was well represented, too, with top writers such as Chuck Cannon, Darrell Scott and Gretchen Peters joining the fun. There were more than 2200 individual performance slots this year, and that doesn't account for those unscheduled stairwell performances. The conference officially kicked off on

Thursday February 6, but the day before saw workshops for festival presenters, aspiring booking agents and those who wanted a crash course on music business basics. Back at the Renaissance, early arriving performers scheduled a few late night showcases. Next day, the conference swung into full panel mode by day and full music mode by night. The art vs. commerce group found music publishers and top hit songwriters agreeing, sometimes eloquently, that writing from the heart is really the only way to make music that matters. In the evening, formal Folk Alliance-sponsored showcases included bluegrasser Tim O'Brien, hot Celtic band Danu and thoughtful storyteller Eliza Gilkyson, as well as a Lifetime Achievement Award for old time music stalwart Ralph Stanley. These formal showcases are in a sense the main stage of the conference, highlighting performers from the wide diversity of Folk's range.

"There's a reason Folk Alliance never comes back to the same hotel twice -- we're too messy!" joked one elevator rider on the way to the private showcases. She was referring to the multitude of showcase artist schedule cards, room change posters, announcements, CD samplers and publicity sheets that had inundated the bulletin boards and tables on the music floors of the hotel and it the lobbies. That is one of the visual hallmarks of Folk Alliance, and they're all necessary, too, as most showcase rooms are assigned after registrants check in and can't be printed in the conference programs.
