

Greetings All, as I write this on deadline, here are my thoughts. Last night I saw Zoe Lewis at the "Shack in the Back", Ellen & Brian's new house concert venue. Wow - I can't wait to see their season. This is good for all of South Florida as more artists will want to play down here.

There is a war going on (day 4 as I write this). Folk music, as well as all arts, offers a great alternative (and reminder) to the seriousness of war and is especially important to inspire and uplift spirits. But, the war has pre-empted the broadcast of my radio show. The logic is simple, NPR, CNN and other quality new sources, experience increased audience awareness at tense times like these and improved ratings. Shows like "Folk & Acoustic Music" and "Prairie Home Companion" do not serve the primary news audience listening so we wait. This is, after all, a business. If the world has not yet been destroyed, perhaps I can convince of few of you to pledge during "Folk & Acoustic Music" in our upcoming pledge (4/6). This does go a long way to show management that folk music is important to you.

Interview highlights in April include Paul from Brambus Records (Switzerland)(4/13). On April 20 Allan Taylor, a folk singer from England, will be with me in the studio. Allan will be in the US to play concerts with Tom Paxton and Happy Traum, and will also present his music at two concert venues in Miami. I will continue with the regular mix of world, blues, bluegrass, old time, and singer songwriter. I will wait on protest music though so I don't loose my job.

CD REVIEW's

Neal Phillips - Lovegrove Street

"Lovegrove Street" is a new release by Neal Phillips, a member of "Trifolkal," a folk trio from the Baltimore

area. The song which endeared the CD to me is his rendition of "The Ash Grove," a beautiful, traditional Welsh tune with words by John Oxenford. Neal does a tender and caring rendition on guitars and voice, with "Trifolkal" members in harmony, the only other instrument is a mandolin. The arrangement is very simple, yet profound and lovely. The first song on the CD is "White Plastic Stackable Chairs," the finer points of which Michael Stock pointed out to me, because I missed some of the references the first time through. "...Chairs" concerns the commonness and uniformity of our times, and he decries (in a pleasant and gently humorous way) the legacy we are leaving for future archaeologists.

"The Ballad of Roy G. Biv" is a song made up from the names of the colors of the rainbow spectrum. The lyric is clever and the melody and accompaniment good. "The Slumber" is a lovely 1-stanza poem set to eloquently gentle, simple music. It is barely over a minute long, but is wonderfully expressive. The title song "Lovegrove Street" is about being confronted by a thief. It is disturbing but very well-written. The CD is sonorously mixed and is very melodically pleasing, and it possesses highly-intelligent lyric-writing. Neal Phillips is a Ph.D. in Ecology, and he works for an environmental consulting firm. June Tabor - Rosa Mundi (2001)

Green Linnet Records GLCD 3139 11 tracks, 46:40

This CD is a gem from Michael Stock's collection. This recording is a sweet garland of haunting songs about roses, made by the legendary June Tabor, with musicians Huw Warren (piano), Mark Emerson (violin, viola), and Richard Bolton (cello). I can recommend all the tracks on this fine CD, but tracks 2 through 7 are sublimely beautiful.

June Tabor comes from England, and she was educated at Oxford, where she began amassing her devoted following. Her first recordings were from the mid-1970's, and she has done a diversity of songs, from ancient folk melodies to modern jazz. She takes chances, and her range in vocal ability and musical tastes makes most of these choices successful. Track 2 is "Belle Rose," sung in French, is of a young girl who resists love's temptation until she might be married. Its melody is vibrant and youthful, carefree. Her accompaniment is a happy violin, almost Cajunlike in its liveliness. Track 4 is Robert Burn's poem "O My Luv's Like a Red Red Rose" with the traditional FOLK CLUB OF SOUTH FLORIDA

"Major Graham" tune carrying the lyric. Again, piano and strings subtly support Ms. Tabor's tender and confident choice of vocal timbre. "Rose in June," track 5 piano-based theme is very Erik Satie-like and delicate. One can easily hear the folk roots of classical music. Violin and strings sinuously complete the mix of the tender piano and her hope-filled, resonant vocal, gently strong with belief in her love and life: "I will enjoy my rose in June". Track 7, "Rhosen wyn" (Winter rose) also brings us a lower register, nearly somber in its religious reverence. It is of the Welsh tradition: the rose represents the Virgin Mary, and a white rose is placed on a virgin's grave. This hymn is sung in German, with gently-stated piano and cello being the primary instruments in the arrangement. www.greenlinnet.com

SPOTLIGHT ON THE ARTIST OF

Pete Seeger

Few individuals have enriched our musical lives in as many ways and for so many years as Pete Seeger. In addition to being America's bestloved folksinger and an untiring environmentalist, Pete Seeger is a national treasure. He has been at the



forefront of the labor movement, the struggle for Civil Rights, the peace and anti-war movements, and the fight for a clean world. He has been a beacon for hope for millions of people all over the world. Once blacklisted from national television for being unafraid to voice his opinions, he was given the nation's highest artistic honors at the Kennedy Center in December 1994. In January 1996 he was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. Although he left Harvard during his second year, in the spring of 1996 he was awarded the Harvard Arts Medal, presented annually to a Harvard graduate who has made an important contribution to the arts. He won a Grammy Award for Best Traditional Folk Album of 1996 for his Living Music recording "Pete." Seeger was born in Patterson, New York, son of Charles and Constance Seeger, whose families traced their ancestry back to the Mayflower. Seeger grew up in an unusually politicized environment. In 1936 he heard the five-string banjo for the first time at the Folk Song and Dance Festival in Asheville, North Carolina, and his life was changed forever.

Seeger made his way to New York in 1938, where he eventually landed a job with the Archives of American Folk Music. By 1940 he had become quite an accomplished musician, thanks in no small part to his enormous self-discipline and Puritan rectitude. On March 3, 1940, a date folklorist Alan Lomax once said could be celebrated as the beginning of modern folk music, Seeger met Woody Guthrie at a "Grapes of Wrath" migrant-worker benefit concert. Seeger's creativity has always seemed nurtured by adversity. Amid the siege-like climate of the late '40s, he and Lee Hays co-wrote "If I Had a Hammer," one of the most optimistic paeans to the possibilities of constructive social change. By 1950 Hays and Seeger, along with Fred Hellerman and Ronnie Gilbert, formed the Weavers and enjoyed instant success with highly sweetened versions of "Goodnight Irene" and other folk tunes. Pete Seeger spent a considerable amount of time in the South during the civil rights marches of the 1960s. It was his variation of an old spiritual, which Seeger called "We Shall Overcome," that has become an anthem of the crusade for equality in America.
