CD Review

Bob Lind Live at The Luna Star Cafe 19 Tracks / 59:36. Released February 10, 2006. Available from www.boblind.com

It is with great joy that I mark the release of this CD. I have been a fan of Bob Lind since his "Elusive Butterfly" became a hit in 1966. I and nearly the rest of America and the world instantly fell in love with his magical, romantic writing style and "the something of the eagle" in his fine performance. To my delight, when I went to the local record store back then, the music available on a division of Liberty Records, World Pacific Records, Don't Be Concerned (WP 1841 for the audiophiles among us) included many of his other very fine songs of the time. It and a later LP, Photographs of Feeling (WP 1851) were and are great prizes of my record library. This CD, Bob Lind Live at The LunaStar Cafe was recorded September 17, 2005, to a packed house.

Tracks 1 and 2 are his introduction by Alexis, followed by his ice-breaker, "I Love to Sing" and "Laughing Song" -acappella - joviality unleashed. Track 3 "Looking for You" is a humorous consideration of a semi-dark poetic report of looking for love in all the wrong ways and a few, odd places. This compilation of 19 track continues throughout with the same high quality of composition and presentation.

His clear, clean melodies, fine guitar-playing and distinct vocals equal his masterful skills as a poet-lyricist throughout this concert. I note how his voice can soar, yet suddenly dive to wrap tenderly around a word. This trait, to me is his unique, endearing signature as an individual, creative vocalist.

Bob Lind is a treasure of our time, here and now, as well as one who is worthy of inclusion in the ranks of "those who in their lives fought for life" (and who, better, love for life and love back to life) and who "wear at their heart the fire's centre" as that Stephen Spender poem "The Truly Great" goes. Please look to Mr. Lind's website above and buy his CD. It's a treasure, long-overdue, but right on time for us here and now. His concerts, as this CD attests - are special, and no one but Bob and his special lady Jan can really appreciate how special and truly delicious are these days of a remerging, vital and creative, romantic and spiritual, visionary poet of a songwriter.

May the world continue to play you both like the beautiful song you have become. You're right - they don't go by for nothing, these moments - they come to touch and carry you. We try so sadly to catch such moments in our hands. The night was magic, and it captured all of us there at Luna Star Cafe for a sumptuous hour or so. May this CD of that night capture and recapture Bob Lind fans and fans-to-be everywhere !

DC is ice and slush, a thousand miles and 50 degrees Fahrenheit from Florida, opening for Chuck Brodsky at Vic's Music Corner, a slew of repair jobs lined up to pay for the trip. I've been trying to balance these two, the starving artist and overweight repairman. I travel with tools for both but have been slowly upgrading the gig bag while thinning out the toolbox. I open

my set at Vic's with a self-deprecating joke. "One thing you don't want to do as an opener is to be better than the main act." Pause. "Tonight this will not be a problem," which got a laugh, and a rebuke at the intermission. "Don't apologize from the stage," a stern man tells me. I did not get his name but his face is clear in my mind, and I will thank him next time I see him. Because he's right. If I approached repair jobs with the same attitude I'd be saying, "Gosh, I'm not that good, I'll probably just put a screw through my thumb, but I'll try to fix your door." Echoes of Chuck Pyle's saying, "Don't be so humble. You're not that important." Humility is fine offstage but has no place on it, a lesson driven home by a stranger.

I get back to Florida and pick up the power tools again, broken things fixed, missing parts found, for about a week, when on the same Friday I get the email notice that I'm a finalist for Plowshares and a phone message from Chuck Brodsky that he wants to cover mv story "In the Beginning" on his new CD, "Tulips for Lunch". I call him back and ask how much it will cost me. He says, no, the way it works is that he pays me. What a country! The songwriter made it to the buffet table this month, the fixit guy to Jenny Craig.

I go over to Fogartyville Cafe in Bradenton to see Michael Troy and bring him back for the shows at The Shack in the Back, Ellen Bukstel and Brain Wolfsohn's replacement concert for the cancelled South Florida Folk Festival, a great two days of music amplified by hanging with Michael, John William Davis, and Eric Schwartz, amplified again by winning the SFFF songwriting contest along with Jen Cass and Jim Photoglo.

Whether by accident or design (like there's a difference) I left my SkilSaw out in the rain last week. It's a start. And if you need any repair work done around your place, I hope you'll consider hiring me for the job.

I'm really not very good.

Did you ever notice at any folk function that there are an abundant number of older folks? I, personally, do not feel that old, just a couple of years shy of 50, but I have to admit the feeling is fleeting when I am the oldest person in the room. I recently went to The Cornerstone - a low-rent gallery in Miami that has a weekly music night - and when I walked in, the friendly crowd referred to me as "pops". This brought home the importance of trying to rejuvenate our folk music audiences, to make it fresh and fun, so it does not die out. There was a discussion at the folk DJ peer session at the recent Folk Alliance in Austin about the listening habits of young people. This is a concern of not only folk djs, but everyone in the radio business. Young people are growing up with new options of listening to and buying music, from satellite to mps and ipods. Radio could very well be a thing of the past if new audiences are not developed. This fact is being acknowledged through the industry, but not many stations are doing anything about it.

In that effort, on my radio show, I have been interviewing younger artists and subsequently , they tell their friends, and I am getting a lot of listeners who are tuning to WLRN for the first time. I get emails from all over the place when an artist uses an internet site called "myspace" to publicize an appearance on my show.

I have to admit I did not set out to interview young kids, it just seems that south Florida has a new generation of quality songwriters and performers. Jesse Jackson, Raffa, Deblois, and Brendan O'Hara - a few names that come to mind. Many of these acts are trainded musicians. I have even seen a surge in quality nationally recording acts that are young and basing their music on traditional folk - acts like The Mammals, The Duhks, and Nickel Creek are drawing big sales numbers and attracting a large number of younger audiences. I just hope this younger audience would put down their Ipod and start listening to the radio.
