You hear this right away when Robert wails one of his soulful and heartfelt stories. You can imagine him on a street corner or in a bar on Rue Dauphine, an integral part of the scenery. With Randy Newman as one of his templates, he draws on old soul, Cajun, jazz sources. As he writes his own songs, with open tuning ala Ritchie Havens, he is making his own way since there are few guide posts for him. He finds this more organic and intellectually challenging.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE ARTIST OF

THE MONTH

Phil Ochs

Phil Ochs was born in El Paso, Texas on Dec. 19. 1940. He grew up in a non-political middle class family. While in college at Ohio State University, he



met Jim Glover who became his roommate and whose father was Phil's political teacher. It was during this time, while he was majoring in journalism, that Phil formed his political beliefs and started putting them to music. After 3 years of college, Phil dropped out and went to New York City. This was during the early '60's when things were booming in Greenwich Village. Phil started out singing at open mikes and passing the hat. By 1964 he was well enough established to release his first album, "All the News That's Fit To Sing". His second album, "I Ain't Marching Anymore", was released in 1965, and by 1966 he was able to sell out Carnegie Hall for his solo concert.

Most of Phil's songs were very political, some humorous and some very serious. He wrote about the topics of the day - civil rights, Vietnam, hungry miners, and personalities such as Billy Sol Estes, William Worthy and Lou Marsh. In 1967 he signed with A&M Records where his first release was "Pleasures of the Harbor" in which he used heavily orchestrated arrangements for the first time. Some fans criticized this change, while others accepted it.

Phil continued to perform and to travel around the world. While in Dar Es Salaam, he was mugged and lost the top three notes of his vocal range. This event seemed to send him on a downward spiral. His last years were troubled ones. He suffered from manic depression plus an affinity for the bottle. He committed suicide on April 9, 1976 at the age of 35.

Many of Phil's songs have been covered by various artists. Some of his best known songs are: "Changes", "There But For Fortune", "I Ain't Marching Anymore", "Draft Dodger", "Small Circle of Friends", Crucifixion" and "When I'm Gone".

There have been 2 biographies written about him. Death of a Rebel by Marc Elliot was written in 1977, and There But For Fortune - The Life of Phil Ochs by Michael Schumacher was published in 1996. Rhino Records released a 3-CD compilation titled Farewells and Fantasies in 1997 which includes all of his best known works plus some previously unreleased tracks. Sliced Bread Records released a double CD of covers of Phil's songs performed by 28 artists in 1998 entitled The Songs of Phil Ochs.

MICHAEL STOCK

on Folk and Acoustic Music

This will be my confession column. Not only will it provide a window into the workings of producing a weekly three hour radio show, but will also expose the quirks of my personality. When I have visitors in the studio Sunday afternoons, folks are surprised that I don't know what music is planned for the show. I am a full time employee of WLRN, hosting the afternoon network programs during the week, and in down time, I am able to listen to and rate music for my show. Boxes in my office containing some 3,000 CDs call out for me to listen to them.

On Sundays, when it is time for my show, I try not to think of the thousands of people listening, but to have a good time. Every song I play I want to be great. Woody Guthrie's writings come to mind when he would leave in misspelled words, he said for the uneducated common folk. Well, I ain't no Woody Guthrie, but if you folks haven't noticed yet, I do make a lot of mistakes. I must be one of those common folk. Though I have not picked specific songs for the show, I do know what songs I like by my marking the back of CDs. I do try to follow themes - world, bluegrass, protest, blues, comedy, inspiring, empowering, though usually not more than 5 or 6 songs in each genre. Most important is the quality of the music because words are useless if you are not listening.

Before my show, I pick 150-200 CDs from the library of over 10,000, and I only get to play 25-35 songs a show. Every week I try to play one of the great musicians, Guthrie, Seeger, Dylan, and others that you do not hear on radio. I like doing interviews for two reasons, first, WLRN is a talk station and I assume listeners like it, and second, to give artists a chance to sell tickets to their show (more subtle on air). The subculture of folk music needs a lot of support, but that is another column. I am grateful for the feedback I get from listeners, constructive criticism (thank an anonymous caller for the music bed behind the

calendar announcements) and ideas for shows. Which brings me to what inspired me to write this month's column. I have nothing planned this month: I am sure something will come up, in fact, I will be on vacation on the 22nd and that show will have to be prerecorded. I do have Jim Flemming and a phone interview with Ellis Paul on Father's Day.

CD REVIEW's

Scott Ainslie - You Better Lie Down

Cattail Records 2002 / 12 songs, 40:47

Take Eric Clapton playing acoustically, add a touch of the clarity of the vocals of the late Joe Williams (the big band singer who sometimes graced The Tonight Show With Johnny Carson), and the sound comes out sounding much like Scott Ainslie. Scott is another artist I am very lucky to "discover" in the extensive library of our own front-line folk show host, Michael Stock. I've heard rumors too, that Mr. Stock wields a mean banjo from time-to-time. (Editors note: anyone possessing first-hand knowledge of this should contact us with his or her testament!)

Back to the matter of Scott Ainslie -- I cried for joy when I heard this CD! I haven't been so moved by a delta blues player since I got into the intricacies of the "Today" album by Mississippi John Hurt. Ainslie's CD is recorded with great care on modern equipment, and the result is a clear and simple, sharp and crisp presentation of classic folk blues tunes which date from the 30's. Mr. Ainslie not only faithfully plays these fine songs in all their power and delicacy, but he has studied the craft from the crossroads of the hinterland itself, traveling the back routes of the American South, recording first-hand many singers. He also studies folk and blues archives in universities.

He is very accomplished both as a scholar and as a musician. The first seven songs are classic delta blues: You Better Lie Down, the title tune dates from the mid 1930's and was discovered on an old record; the 2nd song, Don't Let The Devil Ride, comes from one of his own field recordings of an old man who remembered the original version; song 3, Big Fat Momma, was learned from David "Honeyboy" Edwards, according to the liner notes. The 4th song, Pay Day, is a very faithful rendition of the John Hurt song, which Mr. Hurt played so very well on his forementioned "Today" CD from 1966 (which was produced by Patrick Sky, by the way, a great and innovative folk/acoustic musician in his own right. He and his friend Eric Andersen played here in 1986 or



so, at the Colony Theatre on Lincoln Road.) The next song, *I'll Be Rested When The Roll Is Called* - was learned from an archive in the U. of No. Carolina at Chapel Hill. *Broken Levee Blues*, song 6, recounts the terrible flood of 1927, which has found its way into many different poetic, literary, and musical expressions, from the delta blues to Randy Newman's very moving "Louisiana 1927" song. Mr. Ainslie, in his liner notes tells of a book by John Barry, called "Rising Tide.." which chronicles that awful time.

Phonograph Blues, song 7 is from the work of Robert Johnson, one of Scott's many heroes. Songs 8 and 9 come from recent times, from BB King and Sam Cooke respectively, and both fit into the concept of this album quite well. The rest of the songs return to the roots of this very bountiful tree of history.
