When Adonis Cross sits at a piano or clutches a quitar, he wants to make an intimate, lasting connection with listeners, no matter how many people are listening. "I want to write songs that bring back a focus on well constructed melody and lyrics most everyone can empathize with", says Cross, 23. "I feel



that's what I do best, and I feel there's still an >audience for those kinds of songs." His songwriting and musicianship has earned him comparisons to some of his heroes, among them Aimee Mann and Elton John. As more music fans are exposed to his music, opportunities come for Adonis Cross.

In 2005 Adonis is making plans to maximize his exposure and expand his fanbase - songs for a studio album, tentatively titled "The Wizard of Flaws", have been written and tested on audiences. He has set up a webpage at MySpace.com/adoniscross. "It's great to be able to connect on a personal level with people from around the world, people who like the music, people who want to promote it - and it's great discovering good talent ready to emerge." Report on the Black Banjo Then and Now Gathering

The conference was an enormous success. 300-400 people passed through it even though the location was exceedingly remote, way up in the mountains; in fact, you pass where Doc Watson lives and keep going another 30 miles higher to get there. The



nearest airports were 2.5 hours away with no airport van service to Boone. A lot of great and famous folklorists, banjo collectors and folk singers came just to participate. When I say famous, I mean like Bela Fleck who simply came to the Gathering as an audience member, although he did jam a little.

We had a number of excellent presentations from world experts on the banjo like Ulf Jagfors of Stockholm on African Spiked lutes and the banjo and two players of African relatives of the banjo Cheik Halama Djiabate from Mali and Daniel Jatta from Gambia, a great session on 19th Century finger style banjo led by Clarke Buehling, and a great presentation on African American banjoists' influences on Appalachian banjo style by Mike Seeger, Cece Conway, and Bobby Fulcher.

We also had a great fiddling workshop featuring Joe Thompson, Rique Prince of the Ebony Hill Billies, Kerry Blech, and Rhiannon Giddens. We had a great session where Algia Mae Hinton and Mike Seeger talked and played music connecting the banjo to the blues including one song where Mike borrowed MY banjo (not the Goldtone I have had for a couple years now but my new Fairbanks 1894 model) to play Dock Bogg's "Country Blues."

Best of all, we met a number of African American old time musicians, fiddlers, drummers, banjoists, guitarists and bassists, and got a lot of respect for building this up from people around the country and beyond.

Personally, I felt a great moment came when a bunch of noted banjo collectors presented me with a Fairbanks Electric made in 1894, a fine and fantastic banjo whose sound I can't believe, in token of my work on this project. There are pictures of the gathering on our web site Blackbanjo.com

We left South Florida after 4 weeks in the studio (building, not recording) and two travel days later the mighty 2.2L engine of the 84 Toyota camper

that is our new home has carried us to... North Florida. Don't get me wrong. For a house, the toyo RV is really, really fast. In a race between her and most homes and apartments, she'll likely win. But while posing as a motorized vehicle, we are passed by everything, by cars foreign and domestic, by tandem trucks and trailered boats, by farm equipment and mopeds, by the Joads in a cut up '36 Hudson.

Went to Susquehanna two weeks earlier, a lightly attended festival beautifully set in the rolling watershed hills of Northern Maryland. Saw Johnathan Byrd and Dar Williams for the first time, both awesome. I am lucky enough to win a guitar in the raffle, luckier still to win second place in the songwriting contest. Tuesday after, in DC, in the studio again, (recording, not building), vocal tracks for Chris Chandler's new CD.

We get to Dallas Friday night for the Wildflower! Festival, and though I do not win this year, had a better time than when I did. A set outdoors to a full house, and in the middle of a song that took a year to craft and finish the honey truck pulls up, big diesel rumbling, to the row of port-o-lets stage left. The noise triples as the pump motor kicks in, so I set a driving rhythm to the beat of the compressor and make up a running story and song for 10 minutes that has the crowd clapping in tempo and singing the chorus, the universe telling me to write more simply.

Sunday night, a party for the volunteers at Al Johnson's house, a song circle with Cosy Sheridan, TPR & Cary Cooper, Freebo, Tom Kimmel, on the deck outside with Kat Eggleston on guitar, Karen Mal on mandolin, Elizabeth on fiddle, going through every song on "Tea for the Tillerman", just magical. We charge our batteries, top the water and fuel tanks, and head south for Kerrville.

As I look at my June Calendar, there are no interviews scheduled for my radio show. I am sure it will fill as the month continues, but if not, that just means more music. And I have been getting some great music.

I just returned from the Florida Folk Festival and what a great time. After 53 years, one of the oldest festivals in the country, just went through some major changes. This usually happens when a new director takes over.

I personally did not see much of a change (I do not consider myself an experienced 'goer' though), but the consensus is that too much money was spent on Emmylou Harris - though the many thousands of people there might prove the skeptics wrong.

I am not a big fan of the stars like Emmylou and prefer the surprisingly great, a relatively unknown groups that come from all of Florida. The many stages are rich with storytelling, dancing, crafts and lore, and of course, music.
