You build a wall one brick at a time; you build a capitalistic economy one starry eyed, dream filled entrepreneur at a time. Eighty five percent of the businesses in this are classified as small businesses. When our kids take lemons and sugar out the curb to sell lemonade we encourage



and support them; when someone risks their own money and takes their time and energy to establish a business we applaud and respect them. In this society, one who obtains their livelihood by their own wits and sweat, provides employment for others, benefits others by offering essential or creative goods and services, that person or group is critical to the growth and sustaining of the local and national economy. These people are our heroes, those whom we admire and who become our models.

It has been over six years since Alexis Sanfield opened the Luna Star Café. Generally, if a business lasts one year, it is considered a success; six is a miracle. It has taken constant and creative dealing and planning to cover costs, pay back loans, and stay afloat. Painting your own walls and using lung searing acid to clean the concrete floor are just a few of the things you do yourself, if necessary. And when laws change and smoking is no longer permitted destroying the client base you've been building for six years, you dig in, regroup and find other ways to attract and keep customers. Then, you look at Alexis' unique persona, with her eternally positive outlook and apparently limitless energy all fueled by her determination to keep her cultural anomaly alive and you say, how does she keep it up? How does she put up with changing laws, endless taxes and restrictions and still manage to support a musical genre that has a very thin client base in this South Florida community? The truth is, she probably does not really think much about it. She faces one task, one challenge at a time, does what has to be done and draws her rewards from the smiles, hugs and support of like-mined customers who become friends. She becomes our hero, our model; a brick, a solid element in our society. Thanks Alexis for giving us a place to gather, share and enjoy and for showing us what one committed person can do.

One our most dedicated, accomplished knowledgeable performers, Val is a mainstay and driving force behind the growth folk music is enjoying in South Florida; she nurtured this organization for many years and has been instrumental in its revitalization. She fronted the original folk spoof band Jabberwocky for over twenty years; she was one of the founders of the locally produced and longest running Public Radio show Pandemonium. She has shared the stage with some of the nations best such as John Hartford, John McCutcheon, Christine Lavin, Michael Johnson, Michael Smith, Cozy Sheridan and many more. This is shaping up to be a great month on the radio with a lot of interviews and live performances. I will do an interview with Curtis & Loretta, a duo from Minneapolis, MN who are primarily known for their wonderful musicianship and traditional repertoire - Curtis plays guitar and mandolin and Loretta the harp and guitar, and both sing. They will be here in south Florida to perform and meet Luba Frederick, a holocaust survivor and hero, who lives in our community. Luba Frederick became known as "the Angel of Bergen-Belsen" when at 24 years old, she saved 52 Jewish children from the Nazis. Her story has been put to song by Curtis & Loretta and I will interview them on Nov 9.

On Nov 2, I will interview Pat Humphries and Sandy O, two folk heroes who go to many rallies across the country and are not afraid to stand up for what they believe in. The duo is in town for the Phil Ochs tribute at the Bamboo Room and Main Street Café, and for the anti-war rally in Broward. We can learn a lot from these two.

Speaking of politics, the FTAA meeting is in south Florida later this month, and if history holds true, it will also bring with it a lot of protests and rallies. In the fine folk tradition I plan to play a lot of protest music, old and new, right and wrong, left and right, on Nov 16. The Space Hippie, Glenn Allan will be in the studio that day to perform for us his brand of music. Of course all music aired will represent the opinion of the artists and is for educational purposes, and by no means meant to offend and lead to the canceling of my show. I admittedly realize, while enjoy this type of music myself, I do not want to jeopardize the future of my radio show with offensive material. Also in the works is a tribute to Joni Mitchell on that same day.

In that vein, we are thankful that we are able to protest in this country, thankful that there is a radio shows in south Florida that plays this type of music, thankful that we are alive in such exciting times, and

thankful that America exists. I believe that is the purpose of Thanksgiving Day, and I will reinforce those thoughts on my show on Nov 26

I am sure there will also be other interviews and new CD's through out the month.
